Daniel Murphy holds a BFA from Stephen F. Austin University, in Texas, and is a lighting director for theater productions and television. He is a student of both the American Revolution and the Civil War and has published articles on both wars.

Dressed in uniforms typical of those worn by both British and Continental troops, both speakers limited their presentation to the Southern Campaign of the Revolutionary War, which took place largely in the Carolinas.

Edward explained the component parts of his Continental uniform and the reproductions of two horse saddles of the period that were on display. The primary point Edward made in his presentation was that, while the British had great success in capturing northern cities, such as Boston, Philadelphia and New York, what they really needed for ultimate victory was to control the southern agricultural production of rice, tobacco and indigo.

In describing his British uniform Daniel made reference to the reason the British decided to invade the inland South in 1780. By that time Savannah had fallen to the British, and the war had turned toward Charleston. In order to deprive the Charleston defenders of support coming by way of the Santee River, the British Legion began to engage the Colonials further inland. In a surprise move, the decisive turning point occurred at Cowpens, in South Carolina, when the Continentals, under the command of Daniel Morgan, routed the British regulars commanded by the merciless Banastre Tarleton. Daniel described this battle in detail and encouraged us to visit this important historic site in our own backyard and only about an hour's drive south of Hendersonville.

When not at their usual day jobs, Edward and Daniel can often be found portraying the Third Continental Light Dragoons at living-history events. Occasionally, they also portray elements of Banastre Tarleton's British Legion.
